We are so glad you are here with us for the sisterhood Quilt Along!


This week we will be making blocks 18, 23 and 29!

Peaky and Spike


Doreen Speckmann made Peaky and Spike popular years ago. Peaky is the name she gave to the two side units and Spike is the large center unit. She named them based on how she saw their personalities - which is sew fun!

Of course, like so many other units in quilting, this unit has other names; it sometimes is called Triangles within Squares or the V Block.


What name do you call it?

To cut the Peaky portion, it is very similar to how you approached the Long Rectangles. You'll need to cut two left to right, and two right to left.

For the center Spike unit, follow the directions carefully to mark and cut your four Spike units.



Just as with the Long Rectangles, when trimming make sure you trim so the skinny points are $\frac{1}{8}$ " in from the corners and the center point at the other end is $\frac{1}{8}$ " from the edge so no points get cut off!



You might want to go grab some scraps and make a few practice units before diving into your Joanne block! Practice will improve your accuracy.



Block 18 - Joanne



Joanne is our lone ranger. She is the only block using Peaky and Spike units!

They form her beautiful long star points. Combine them with 5 four patch units and you're done! Easy peasy.


Block 18 - Joanne's Story

Block 23 - Betty



Betty is a bit of a loner as well. She has a fun and interesting side unit made up of a square, two quarter square triangles and half square triangles. The Fabric E quarter square triangles are NOT oversized to ensure you get the correct size when adding the larger Fabric B and F half square triangles.

If you want a bit of wiggle room, you can enlarge the Fabric B and F squares so, once cut, the half square triangles will be a little oversized. But note, if you oversize, you will need to trim up your final unit before adding the rectangles to complete the side units.

Slow and steady - you've got this!

Kate:


Betty was one of my husband's aunties. She was a unique and wonderful woman. She recently passed away at age 93. She had a wonderful way of

Block 29 - Wini



Remember those Partial Quarter Square Triangle units from a few weeks ago? They're back!

With Wini, you will be making THREE - we kid you not - different Partial Quarter Square Triangle Units. You won't be using the Studio 180 method here, because each set will need to be identical.

As before, fabric placement matters. Please pay close attention to the position of your small quarter square triangles and large half square triangles for each set.
