



HOW TO MAKE A QUILT LABEL



Three different ways!

USING FREEZER PAPER

You will need an inkjet printer, 1 piece of freezer paper and 1 piece of fabric cut to the size of the freezer paper.

1. Press the fabric to the wrong side of the freezer paper.
2. Insert the paper/fabric page into the printer so the fabric side will be printed on.
3. Print the label onto the fabric side of the page.
4. Cut out the label; 4 ½" x 3 ½".
5. Turn under the raw edges ¼" and sew to the back of the quilt!

USING PRINTER FABRIC

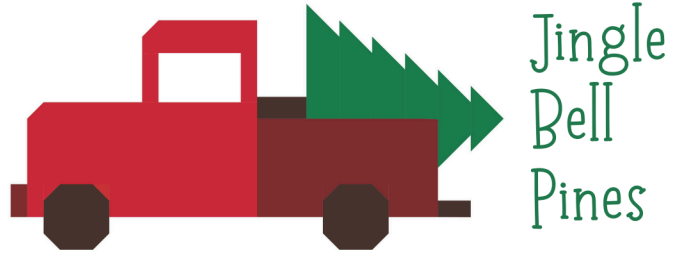
You will need an inkjet printer, 1 sewable inkjet fabric sheet, 1 piece of white fabric and leftover binding scraps.

1. Insert the inkjet fabric sheet into the printer so the fabric side will be printed on.
2. Print the label onto the fabric side of the page.
3. Cut out the label; 4 ½" x 3 ½".
4. Cut the binding strip in half lengthwise. Cut 2 pieces the width of the label and sew a piece to each side. Press to binding.
5. Cut 2 pieces the length of the label (with binding) and sew to the top and bottom of the label.
6. Place the label RST with the white fabric and sew all around the outside, leaving a 2-3" opening at the bottom for turning.
7. Turn right sides out through the opening and sew to the back of the quilt, closing the opening as you sew.

USING FUSIBLE WEB

You will need 1 label created following a method above and 1 piece of double sided fusible webbing.

1. Fuse the webbing to the wrong side of the label following manufacturer's instructions. Be sure to use a pressing sheet to protect the iron and the ironing surface.
2. Trim the label to 4" x 3".
3. Peel off the paper from the other side of the fusible and position the label on the back of the quilt.
4. Press the label to the quilt to fuse in place.
